DEAR FRIENDS,

A farewell to summer always feels a bit bittersweet. Summer is such an anticipated season in Northeast Ohio and at the Nature Center. Each summer we see our beautiful marsh in full bloom, and this summer was no different with the gorgeous splendor of our signature rose mallow. We watched over 300 campers experience the outdoors full of smiles and giggles, we basked in the warm sunshine, and found cool shade under our canopy of trees, which provide beauty, habitat, and flood water management all year long. As summer fades, these bright green leaves will turn to stunning shades of yellows, reds, and oranges. With the change in season, we now prepare to greet our school groups for their hands-on field science programs utilizing our outdoor classroom.

This fall will mark the 10th anniversary of our Applied Science for Kids! (ASK!) Program with Cleveland Metropolitan School District (CMSD), which has become our largest educational program. Since the program's creation in 2013, the Nature Center has served classes from every one of CMSD's elementary schools and hosted over 35,000 CMSD students at our 20-acre outdoor classroom. The anniversary gives us the opportunity to look back on the incredible impact of this program. I am extremely proud to share our mission with the CMSD students and immerse them in nature.

Additionally, I am thrilled to welcome back our Hike & Run event on September 18 after a few years of a modified format, which ensured the safety of our participants and community during the pandemic.

My focus this season will be leading succession planning and strategic visioning to prepare the organization for my retirement next spring, after 15 years as President & CEO. We've spent the last five years making long-term investments in infrastructure to further our mission to conserve a natural area, connect people with nature, and inspire environmental stewardship, this pivot will help us ensure a successful transition of leadership and continue to build on our past success to find innovative ways to achieve our mission. The Board of Trustees recently decided to hire a search firm to conduct a national search for our next President & CEO and we look forward to sharing more information as that process unfolds.

To facilitate the strategic visioning process, we have also hired Business Volunteers Unlimited (BVU) as our strategic planning consultant, who will work in partnership with a diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility (DEIA) consultant, Gradient Think Tank, to ensure we are looking toward the future through an equity lens.

With so many things in the works, I can't help but be excited to welcome the beauty and cooler temperatures of fall. To help us celebrate the season and gorgeous fall colors, I hope you will join us and let your imagination soar on October 1 for AutumnFest, powered by PNC, bringing our community together to experience Fairy Tales in the Forest.

TREE IDENTIFICATION SELF-GUIDED WALK

This self-guided tour will take you around the Nature Center's trails in search of some of our most prominent and often overlooked tree species. You'll find Witchhazel, which flowers in late fall with yellow blooms and has exploding seeds. Seek out the sister oaks, two magnificent red oaks on Stearn's Trail. Look for Tupelo and its brilliant red leaves near the Marsh. All this and more are waiting to be found! Pick-up the self-guided tour at the Welcome Desk this fall to explore and uncover all the trees on our trails.





FALL SPLENDOR AT THE NATURE CENTER

Fall is one of the most beautiful times of the year at the Nature Center as foliage changes from green to a range of warm colors. There are a number of trees that stand out for their superb fall color at the Nature Center.

Here are a few and where to look for them on your visit.

TUPELO (Nyssa sylvatica)

For a scarlet red, it is hard to beat Tupelo (Nyssa sylvatica), you can find them just off the All Peoples' Trail boardwalk. With the brilliant foliage and pyramidal shape, you won't want to miss the Tupelo tree this fall.



BUR OAK

Bur oak is worth investigating for its interesting acorns alone. The caps are deep and fringed, nearly swallowing up the acorn. The leaves will turn a golden yellow, look for them just off the All Peoples' Trail.



WITCH-HAZEL

Witch-hazel is another yellow showstopper. This small, shade tolerant tree flowers in fall, often blooming until the first snow! The flowers are thin and resemble miniature crepe paper streamers. Check the leaves for insect galls that resemble pointed witch hats! Just past nature play area off short boardwalk.



SERVICEBERRY

Another small tree worth seeing is the serviceberry. Often planted for their fall color, the service berry turns a brilliant redorange. We have a number of them around the center including several in the Lavelle Amphitheater and surrounding Jimmy's Treehouse. Complete our self-guided tree tour to see some of these trees looking their best this fall!

LEAF CHANGE - & -**MARCESCENCE**

As autumn leaves change from green to red, gold and yellow, there is biology happening behind the scenes! The green in leaves comes from chlorophyll, but it's not the only pigment in leaves. In the fall, as the temperature drops, many plants begin to break down their chlorophyll and this is when we get to see the other pigments that have been there all along. Carotenoids are responsible for yellow, orange and gold tones and they are used in photosynthesis and sun protection. Anthocyanins are responsible for the red and purple hues. This chemical compound helps protect from temperature and insect damage.

You may have noticed that some leaves do not fall from the trees, despite them looking dead. This phenomena is known as marcescence. There are several species in our area that share this behavior. American beech (Fagus grandifolia) likes to hold its leaves which become pale and papery thin, well into the winter, often looking like a ghostly tree in the woods. All species of oaks may hold their leaves as well. Pin oak (Quercus palustris) for example, may hold its leaves until spring. The exact reason of theories. Trees may keep the leaves as a delayed source of fertilizer or mulch, dropping them around their base early in the year as the trees begin to awaken from winter. Perhaps they help deter herbivores from browsing on delicate twigs and developing buds as the dry and unappealing leaves

Q: Fun fact about yourself:



SEED DISPERSAL

Seeds of plants come in many shapes, colors, sizes and designs. All plants need water, sun (energy), air, and space to grow. A seed cannot get all those things if it falls right next to the parent plant because the parent plant is using all those resources. Therefore, seeds are designed to relocate or disperse to a new location. Seeds cannot move from one place to another like an animal, so they have evolved over time with different methods to disperse to new places.

Check out some plants below and how their seeds disperse!

SILVER MAPLE





Designed to travel by the use of wind and cover great distances to new places. Also known as helicopters or whirligigs.

WITCH HAZEL





This seed pod has shiny black seeds that, when ready, will burst or forcibly eject up to 30 feet away.

EUROPEAN ALDER





The seeds in the seed pod are designed to float on water for about a month. This allows them to find new places that are far from the parent plant.

Answer: Woodpecker

R E D O A K





This seed, known as an acorn, mainly gets dispersed by animals.
The seeds are collected by animals, like squirrels, and buried for eating later.
Some acorns are forgotten and grow into new trees.
