

DEAR FRIENDS.

With so many uncertainties this year, the Nature Center remained deeply rooted in our mission. Before the pandemic, we served a record number of people through our educational, nature-based programs and events. School children soaked up critical science and environmental lessons, and of course, fresh air. When school field trips were cancelled in March, we swiftly adapted these same lessons to a virtual format, innovating to reach and share nature moments and education with those in the region and beyond. Our trails and 20 acres of habitats remained open as a safe, natural place for outdoor activity—offering a physical escape from the confining walls of our homes, and respite from the stresses brought forth by a world which was seemingly upended overnight.

Despite the challenges posed during the last year, we were able to maintain our focus. We restored native habitats by planting 2,312 new trees, shrubs, and plants, providing crucial habitats for animals and birds often pushed out by urbanization. This will strengthen the biodiversity of our preserve and offer invaluable educational experiences.

This year highlighted one important piece of our mission: welcoming everyone in our community to enjoy a beautiful, natural place. Our new, fully accessible All People's Trail (APT) has allowed us to serve you in unique and exciting ways. Through the generosity of our community, we were able to unveil this rebuilt and enhanced trail, coming in under budget and on schedule—fortuitously ensuring the trail was available when you needed it the most. This past year, we saw a three-fold increase in visitation on the APT.

While respecting the safety of our visitors and staff, we persevered with the planned repair and improvement of our Stearns Woodland Trail. Over the summer we restored the trail, built bridges that will



protect wetland areas, and added a nature play area, among other features. This is all part of our five-year vision and capital campaign to foster our outdoor classroom, which is proving to be prescient. These are glimpses into YOUR FUTURE at the Nature Center at Shaker Lakes as we continue to reinvigorate and enhance YOUR PARK, bringing nature experiences to life to further attract and engage a broad range of visitors.

In an urban landscape, it is a difficult balance to coexist with nature, and opportunities for outdoor, environmental education can be limited. Yet, we exist in this special urban space for you, as an integral part of the surrounding neighborhoods and communities. We see you walking the trails, watching and listening for birds, playing alongside the Doan Brook, and learning with nature. There are also the quiet moments hidden from humanity that are more difficult to see, but that peacefully exist around us: life under logs, fungus thriving, tiny salamanders foraging for insects, and millipedes crawling under leaf litter. Together, these experiences form the heart of the 20 acres that we are so fortunate to share with all of you.

We have overcome many challenges throughout the pandemic and were able to fulfill our mission more deeply than we could have imagined—thanks to YOU. Our incredible team of staff and trustees has been our backbone. Your support allowed us to keep our trails open, our programming strong, and carry on our work to enhance precious native habitats. As the novel coronavirus has proven, our world is deeply interconnected, and we must work together to sustain our environment for the future. We hope you will continue this journey with us to educate, connect, and steward our beautiful and accessible gem where humanity and wildlife coexist with such grace.



The Nature Center's role in our community has become even more apparent in the last year as thousands have flocked to our trails during COVID-19. Public natural areas like the Nature Center are essential community infrastructure for health and well-being and as such, we saw a 270% increase in trail usage since the pandemic began.

Fortunately, we have been able to accommodate this surge in visitors with one of the largest highlights of Fiscal Year 2020-the grand opening of our NEW All People's Trail. With its larger observation areas and new features such as the Rose Foundation Gazebo and the Cleveland Foundation North Woodland Trailhead, the trail has drawn new visitors to experience and connect with nature. Its construction was made possible by our campaign supporters to date, who have invested in the Nature Center's comprehensive, multi-year vision—Enhancing Your Outdoor Classroom: A Campaign for the Nature Center at Shaker Lakes.

In May 2020, we began construction on the Stearns Woodland Trail. This spring, we plan to move forward with the final phase of the campaign, which includes a treehouse, new community trailhead entrances, parking lot improvements, and new wayfinding and interpretive signage that will help visitors interact with and learn from our habitats.

In the coming months, look for new, exciting opportunities to join us as we move into the final phase of **Enhancing Your Outdoor Classroom**. As the campaign nears completion and we work to expand our capacity to meet the growing needs of our region, your support will be critical in continuing to provide free, outdoor experiences to people of all ages and abilities.
