BANDING BIRDS FOR SCIENCE

In a quiet corner of our All People's Trail, myself and a team of dedicated volunteers wait for birds. Equipped with tiny metal ankle bracelets, scientific notebooks, and mist nets, we band wild birds—for science.

I began the Nature Center at Shaker Lakes Bird Banding Project in 2001 to learn more about the lives of birds. While most of the birds we band are migratory, we also band birds that live their entire lives only within our 20-acres.

Birds are carefully captured using mist nets. Resembling a 4-tiered volleyball net, the black nylon nets are hard to see against vegetation. Birds flying through the area are swaddled within the net and taken to the bird banding station—a simple plastic table with a few volunteers—where we record the bird's species, age, sex, wing length, fat, and muscle. Birds are fitted with a small, aluminum band on a leg with a unique nine digit number. This simple process only takes a few minutes, and the bird is released soon after. Banding permits are required from both the Federal and State Governments, and data is sent to the Black Swamp Bird Observatory and ultimately the Bird Banding Laboratory of the Federal Government.

The Nature Center is a great place for birds to call "home." Amazingly, a number of migratory songbirds have returned year after year, having traveled for hundreds of miles, only to return to raise their next brood at the Nature Center, which is astounding.

Why is the Nature Center the ideal spot for bird banding?

The rich diversity of habitats within a mere 20 acres creates an incredible opportunity to expose children in environmental education programs to birds and scientific research. The construction of the All People's Trail in 2019 resulted in positive changes to the habitat, with non-native trees and shrubs removed prior to the construction and new native trees and shrubs replanted in the area. This means better and more plentiful food sources to attract migrating and resident birds.

I banded a two year old song sparrow on my first day of banding at the Nature Center. I recaptured this bird each of the next 7 years, so we know he lived to be at least 9 years old. Many songbirds perish in their first year of life.

In handling birds through banding, I get a sense of their temperaments. The feistiest bird based on size is the black capped chickadee. Weighing 11 grams, this tiny bird is fearless, often pecking me to let it go. Other birds, like thrushes, are very calm in my hand. Perhaps the most rewarding aspect of my work is the ability to teach students at the Nature Center about a bird in my hand and see their eyes light up with awe and curiosity. Birds are incredible and show how we are all interconnected with living things on Earth.

Bird banding takes place Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings from the third week in April through May, and again the third week in August through October each year.

The Nature Center at Shaker Lakes is one of several satellite banding stations of the Black Swamp Bird Observatory. More information at shakerlakes.org.

NEW SPARROW SONG GOES VIRAL
