Since 1966, the Nature Center's unwavering mission has been to conserve a natural area, connect people with nature, and inspire environmental stewardship. For the past 54 years, we have remained grounded in a legacy of civic involvement and environmental access for all, welcoming a diversity of visitors. We understand our visitors enjoy and use our 20-acres in a variety of ways—each as unique as the habitats and native species that make up this special place.

The Nature Center as YOUR PARK:

Situated in the heart of the larger Shaker Parklands, our grounds, trails, and habitats have remained free and open to the public. A community asset, visitors come from all over northeast Ohio to enjoy and take advantage of the outdoor recreational opportunities we offer: walking, hiking, viewing nature, or just sitting and enjoying the quiet respite of the outdoors. Throughout the last year, we have seen more and more people seeking the solace and safety of outdoor recreation and stepping foot onto our trails.

The Nature Center as YOUR PRESERVE:

In addition to offering an outdoor greenspace nestled in a beautiful and eclectic community, the Nature Center in its true form is a nature preserve; an area of native habitats that are conserved and managed, where animals and plants are protected—with few buildings or homes. This makes us truly unique, especially within an urban setting such as Cleveland. In addition to offering select recreational activities, we provide educational opportunities and programming, which are rooted in environmentalism and science. Our eight biodiverse habitats allow us to serve the community and create an outdoor classroom where the lessons of conservation come to life as visitors connect with the beauty and inspiration of nature. Contrary to our name, the 20-acres of conserved habitats we manage do not include Lower or Horseshoe Lakes, which are instead part of the greater Shaker Parklands and are managed by the cities of Shaker Heights and Cleveland Heights, along with the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District. We partner with various volunteer and city groups to ensure the entire parklands remain a beautiful place for our community of neighbors and visitors.

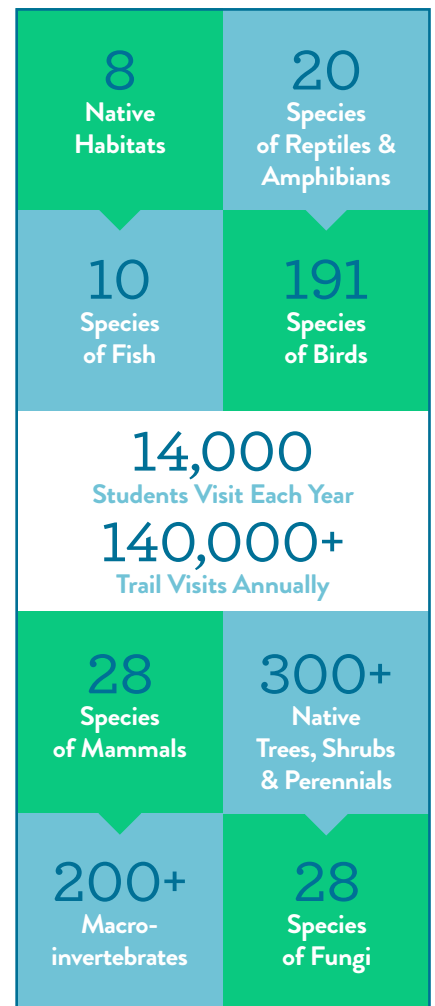

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Friends,

Happy spring! As the weather warms, I look forward to the “buzz” of early pollinators, such as bees and flies, as they search for the first fresh blooms of spring across our 20 acres.

The delicate relationship between plants and pollinators is fascinating to me. In addition to the obvious signs of warmer weather, springtime reminds me that pollinators are critical to our nature preserve and greater ecosystem. Nearly three-fourths of all flowering plants need pollination, most of which come from insects such as bees, butterflies, moths, flies, wasps, and beetles. Taking time to observe pollinators helps me appreciate that it takes a diverse group of organisms to help our ecosystems thrive.

Spring signifies a time for new beginnings and reflection. It is hard to believe that it has been a year since the Nature Center building temporarily closed to the public due to COVID-19. Like so many small businesses, nonprofits, and cultural institutions across our region, this global pandemic has had a significant economic impact on our operations. While our trails and outdoor spaces remained open, our staff transitioned to working remotely, moving much of our programming online. However, the elimination of in-person gatherings resulted in decreased revenue. This fiscal year, we had to make significant cuts to the budget which resulted in reductions in staff hours and executive compensation. Sadly, these decisions have impacted our most valuable asset—our staff.

Like nature, we are resilient. We remain committed to our employees as well as the preservation and management of our 20 acres, while building and sustaining a solid future for our region. Much like the mutualistic relationship between plants and pollinators, we relied on you to help us through this difficult time and in return we have remained here for you—a welcoming and accessible nature preserve for all. I have been so humbled by and am grateful for the way our community has supported us.

As we develop a reopening plan with your health and safety in mind, we welcome your continued visits to our newly renovated trails, attendance at our programs and the upcoming 39th Annual Plant Sale and Homegrown Sale, which includes our online plant sale beginning March 22. I hope you will join me in purchasing native perennials and beautiful annuals that will support our local pollinators. I also hope to see you at our annual benefit, Nature at Night, on June 5. Watch for more details soon.

JUNIOR NATURALIST

Spring is a time of change as the weather warms and the daylight hours get longer. Plants are also waking up with new buds, flowers, and leaves. Some smaller critters have an important job to help our plants around us. We call these animals POLLINATORS, and they help plants to make fruit and seeds. Bees, butterflies, and moths do this by moving pollen, a fine powdery substance, from flower to flower, so that flowers can continue to make seeds for the next year.

Go explore and look for flowers on the ground or in trees. Can you find pollinators flying from flower to flower?
